Duncan's Message

Lectionary Readings for Sunday 13th December Advent 3

Psalm 126, Isaiah 61:1-4 & 8-11, 1 Thessalonians 5:16-24, John 1:6-8 & 19-28.



I remember once hearing a minister giving a talk on religious paintings; unfortunately I cannot remember who painted the pictures but the focal point of the picture was the infant Jesus being held by Mary and surrounded by people; in a lower corner of the picture was an infant John the Baptist. It was clear to me from the composition of the picture that John the Baptist had been carefully placed so that as your eye wandered out the picture and away from its main focal point of Jesus, you came to John and your eye was immediately directed back again to look at Jesus. The painter of the picture is one of many to position John the Baptist in this way, as does Leonardo da Vinci in the picture 'The Virgin and Child with Saint Anne and Saint John the Baptist,' a way that is consistent with how John the Baptist describes himself in our reading from John's Gospel.

John is an important part of the first coming of Jesus and his ministry and essential for the preparation of people to meet with Jesus. John does not seek to make himself the centre of attention but transfers all the attention to Jesus. The role of the church and our mission is to direct people's attention away from themselves and towards Jesus. We may feel limited in what we can do at the moment and, with masks and social distancing, we certainly can't do what Paul suggests at the end of his letter and greet one another with a holy kiss but what we can do is to pray and be thankful and joyful in the circumstances we currently face.

Prayers for the persecuted church

Bangladesh

Until recently, Bangladesh was mostly free of Islamic extremism, but the government is now struggling to counter the growing strength of radical Islamic groups. Persecution also comes from closer to home. Christian converts from other faiths - Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism - often suffer at the hands of their families and communities. The violence of these attacks has particularly accelerated.

Let us pray that God will frustrate the plans of Islamic extremists and protect the people of Bangladesh; for joy and strength for those who've converted to Christianity from other faiths, and for wisdom for Open Doors workers helping vulnerable Bangladeshi believers. Amen.
